Coyote Important Safety Information

If you encounter a coyote:

- Do not run instead, remain calm and stand your ground.
- Make yourself appear larger by raising your arms and making loud noises to deter the animal (carrying an umbrella and popping it open is a great way to make noise).
- Keep pets safe by ensuring dogs are on a secure leash no longer than six feet at all times.

DEVELOPMENT

Markville Mall

Markham City Council has approved an Official Plan Amendment submitted by Cadillac Fairview for a major redevelopment of the Markville Mall site. The approved plan includes a four-phased mixed-use development that will include retention of the existing shopping centre, residential units, public parks, a potential site for a new school, community amenity space and underground parking.

Mount Joy Secondary Plan

A Secondary Plan is a detailed land use plan for a specific area within a city. Council approved the Mount Joy Secondary Plan, which outlines the long-term vision for growth and development in the area. However, some landowners have appealed parts of the plan to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT).

5871 Highway 7 East

An application was submitted to re-designate this property from mixed-use mid-rise to residential high-rise, including proposing a 13-story building. Council approved the same overall gross floor area (GFA) but reduced the height to 10-stories to better align with the surrounding established neighbouhood. The applicant has appealed Council's decision to the OLT.

5305-5307 Highway 7 East

Originally proposed as 32 stacked back-to-back townhouse units with an underground garage, the application was later revised to 30 stacked back-to-back townhouse units. The applicant has also appealed to the OLT.

Drawings for both these Highway 7 applications are available on the city website under MAPPIT.

These appeals will now be reviewed through the OLT process, which will determine the final outcomes.

CONSTRUCTION NOISE BY-LAW

The operation of any equipment connected with construction is only allowed between Monday to Friday, from 7am to 7pm, and Saturday, from 9am to 5pm. Construction noise is prohibited Sundays & all Statutory Holidays.

This Construction Noise By-law includes home renovations and roof replacement/shingling.

CITY BOULEVARDS

Did you know? In all areas of Markham, the City owns a portion of the front yard, and in the case of corner lots the side yard, of residential properties. This city-owned section (known as the boulevard) can extend 15-20 feet or more from the road towards your home, especially in the older areas. Under the *Road Occupancy By-Law*, you cannot make any changes to the "city boulevard" without a permit. This includes widening of your driveway apron, cutting the curb, removing or paving around city owned trees, and paving or landscaping around streetlights or utility boxes.

If you are planning to install fences, retaining walls, landscape design walls, irrigation systems, or decorative landscaping features like garden beds in your front, side or back yard, it's important to first confirm your property boundaries by a qualified surveyor. As you might guess, any installations done on city property may be deemed to be a problem, and if so, the property owner may

be required to remove them at their own cost.



KEEP MARKHAM BEAUTIFUL BY-LAW

As a homeowner or a tenant, the state of your property not only affects the value of your property but affects the neighbourhood and other residents. Let's all do our part to ensure that our streets have a visually attractive curb appeal. Highlights of our Keep Markham Beautiful By-law include:

- Every owner shall maintain their property clear of all waste material. Inoperable vehicles cannot be stored on a property.
- Grass must be trimmed to grow no higher than 6 inches. Note: You are also responsible for maintaining the boulevard in front of your home and the boulevard at the side of your home if you live on a corner.
- All hedges, bushes and shrubs shall be maintained from becoming overgrown and unsightly.
- Fences are to be maintained in a state of good repair.



TREE PRESERVATION BY-LAW Call before you cut!

A reminder that the Tree Preservation By-law 2023-164 protects and regulates trees on both private and city properties. On private property, you require permission to remove or "injure any tree" with a trunk 20cm diameter or greater measured at 1.37m from ground. On city property, all trees are protected, no matter their size.

"Injury" includes anything that could damage a tree,

whether done on purpose or by accident. This can include:

• Cutting of live tissue including roots, trunk, branches or a tree's crown (top branches) • Pruning branches indiscriminately • Damaging the roots, soil or water supply

• Material storage, equipment use and access within a tree's minimum tree protection zone, for purposes of construction or landscaping

It is ok to prune branches for regular maintenance, as long as the pruning or removal is in accordance with good arboricultural practices. You can learn more about why hiring a qualified tree expert such as an ISA Certified Arborist is worth it, and tips for tree care maintenance here: https://www.treesaregood.org/

Trees are important to all municipalities as they help improve air quality, they provide cooling shade that reduces urban heat, they support biodiversity by offering habitat for wildlife and trees play a vital role in fighting climate change. To support Markham's tree canopy, a permit must be



obtained prior to the removal of a tree regardless of condition.
