#### Working Hard For You

Prior to the official inaugural on December 1<sup>st</sup>, I met with multiple city departments to address the concerns you brought to my attention while I was at your doorstep.

Your strong voice for traffic relief and better winter maintenance made them my top priorities for the past three months. On the traffic front, I met with superintendents, school parent councils, principals, and residents to discuss strategies of increasing student safety around school zones. I have been working with city staff to install traffic signals at Stonebridge Dr. and William Berczy Blvd on Bur Oak Ave., and establish speed control measures on 19<sup>th</sup> Ave.

As for winter maintenance, I worked closely with our operations department to ensure consistent, responsive and satisfactory snow removal for all residents. My e-newsletter and social media provide regular updates for vehicular and pedestrian safety.

In my role as Vice Chair of the Budget Committee, we collaborated with city staff and members of Council to achieve the lowest tax increase in York Region. We are proud to attain the balance between excellent service and low taxes, so our residents receive the best value for their dollar.

## TRAFFIC RELIEF

**New traffic signals** will be installed at Bur Oak Ave. & Stonebridge Dr., and Bur Oak Ave. & William Berczy Blvd. The design phase of the project is currently underway and they are anticipated to be in service by the end of 2015.

**Radar speed display boards** have proven to educate and reduce vehicle speed by up to 20%. As part of Markham's Safe Streets Strategy, speed boards will be placed at these priority locations in Ward 6 from March to May:

- 19th Ave. (between Warden Ave. & Kennedy Rd.)
- The Bridle Walk (between 16th Ave. & Bur Oak Ave.)

# WINTER MAINTENANCE RECAP

Our operations department provide efficient, cost effective and consistent winter maintenance service for roads and sidewalks within the operational jurisdiction of Markham.

Once the storm has stopped and accumulations have reached 7.5cm, we get to work! We plow over 2000kms of road with 200 pieces of equipment to ensure service levels are met. Sidewalks are maintained both during and after snowfall. Sidewalk machines are out salting in the evenings after snowfall to ensure pedestrian safety.

# FOAM RECYCLE

Markham has been an environmental leader in polystyrene foam recycling for over 15 years, diverting more than 600 tonnes from going into the landfill. When you bring your used foam to any of the four community recycling depots (not accepted in Blue Bin), they clean and compress them into bricks of plastic that gets turned into picture frames, office supplies and decorative mouldings. So the next time you finish your take out, save the foam containers and bring them to our recycling depot!



# **Growth Management**



Markham Council approved the City's 2015 budget and a tax rate increase of 2.5%. The increase represents an additional \$27.50 for the average residential household in Markham.

The 2.5% increase is the **lowest in York Region**, and is lower than the previously expected 3.81%. Based on multiple public reports on the 2015 municipal tax rate increases, Markham's 7-year tax rate increase of **7.99% is the lowest among 27 GTA municipalities**. This equals to a saving of \$20 million for Markham tax payers over the past 7 years.

# LANEWAY LIGHTING IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY!

Ensuring a safe community is a priority for City of Markham. A feature to enhance safety in some neighbourhoods is the lighting for laneways. This light feature provides well lit areas for motor vehicles and pedestrians, discourages unwanted persons in the area, and assist the police and other emergency services during a response.

The lights are installed on private property. Thus, keeping them lit and maintained is the responsibility of the property owner. This requirement is registered on title and is disclosed to purchasers when buying the property.






# NORTH MARKHAM FUTURE URBAN AREA (FUA)

To accommodate the Provincial Growth Plan population and employment projections of 2031, the 2010 Council adopted the 60-20-20 growth strategy (60% in existing communities-20% in developing communities-20% in Future Urban Area).

The goal of the Future Urban Area is to build compact, complete communities that include a combination of housing and jobs, community core with shops and services, parks and open space network, and community facilities (e.g. schools, churches, community centres).







**Wismer Park**'s parking lot improvement and landscaping is expected to complete in July. A maintenance building will also be added. A community meeting for public input is scheduled for May, and construction will begin this fall.

Angus Glen Community Park will begin construction in May. It will include a pavilion, public washroom, children's playground, water play, skateboard area, basketball court, soccer field, and sheltered seating area.

**Upper Unionville** is planned to have 7 small parks in the future. Berczy Square will begin construction in June.

A district-wide, 100 acres **sports park** will be developed in the North Markham Future Urban Area.
